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A DAY IN THE LIFE

Monica Herring: Lollipop Lady

Four years ago, Monica Herring, meal supervisor at Martin Infant School, (where she was once a pupil in the nursery class) answered a police advertisement. It was for the post of Lollipop Lady.

"If I'd known how stressful the job would be, I'd never have applied," she says. But apply she did, and after an interview and medical with particular emphasis on eyesight and hearing she came successfully through a morning's training session on the crossing.

From then on, her working day has begun at 8am, when she picks up her gear from Martin School. Cold weather doesn't bother her. She wears a thermal vest and balaclava (with antlers attached at Christmas), and the leggings and well known yellow coat are waterproof and windproof.

Her bugbear can be the pole, which she has to carry all the time. Though not heavy, it can be difficult to control in a very strong wind. "The other week, it felt as though my shoulder was being pulled out of it's socket.

At 8.15am, Monica is out on the crossing. First, she turns on the lights at either side of the road. These were provided after persistent lobbying by Martin Parent/Teacher Association.

By this time, the first children are already arriving. "why I'm still doing this job is because the children are fantastic. They really are very good."

Martin put a high premium on training in road safety. Children and their adult escorts are warned that traffic needs time to stop. Unfortunately, some drivers resent stopping at all. The morning shift is full of rush hour tension. "I know drivers sometimes wonder why I won't let them go. The thing is that I can see all round. I can see possible dangers that drivers can't. also, some people don't realise that directly I step out on the road, traffic on both sides has to stop".

On one occasion, a driver furious at being halted, aimed his vehicle straight at her. On the other hand, a passing motorist once handed her a bunch of roses.

The shift ends at 9.15am, but Monica has to be back at school by 12.00, wearing her meal supervisor's hat. With

four colleagues, she pours out drinking water, mops up spills, and cuts up the food for the little ones. (Some are only 4 years old.) slightly older ones often need a guiding hand with their knives and forks.

Children can choose from 2 or 3 menus, one of which is always vegetarian. Baked beans and chips are top of the pops, but emphasis on healthy eating puts an embargo on chip's more than once or twice a month!

Once a month, the "dinner ladies" have a meeting with the Head. Otherwise, there's and off duty period between 1.20pm and 2.50pm. then it's back on the crossing for an hour.

When she wants to unwind, she swims or works on her allotment. Home is Richmond Road, where she still lives in the house where she was born. She once used to roller skate down Long Lane, in the middle of the road.

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
