The Umpire strikes back

Give yourselves a test. Are these statements right or wrong.

1) Jack Hobbs, the idolised and record-breaking cricketer of the 1920's and 30's had his bats made in East Finchley.

2) Young people today are not interested in playing cricket.

The first one is right, bats for many famous players came from a factory in what is now Hobbs Green, at the end of Church Lane.

The second statement? Well, fashionable opinion may still assert that the only sport it is cool to care about is football, but don't let that kind of flannel fool you. The willow isn't weeping yet.

Bishop Douglass is one of the local schools making use of the coaching facilities at the Wilf Slack memorial Ground in East End Road.

Older Finchley residents may remember this ground as the long deserted "what used to be called Smith's playing field". Cricket fans will certainly remember Wilf Slack as the Middlesex and England opening batsman one of the first England players of West Indian origin who tragically collapsed and died from a heat condition during a match.

Reverse sweep

The Wilf Slack Young Cricketers Development Trust has taken over and renovated the ground in East End Road. Trustee Victor Cook, Chairman of the M.C.C. Development Association, raised about £560,000 from events like golf days and dinners at Lords. Other money has come from the National Lottery, the Foundation for Sport and Arts and various businesses Pentland is the major sponsor, hence the name of the new pavilion.

Extra cover

The main aim of the Trust is

"to coach kids and provide cricket facilities for schools", lack of these facilities is one of the reasons often given for their neglect of the game. So how are the schools reacting? Apparently, Bishop Douglass is by no means alone in bringing along its pupils for sessions in the nets.

However, this is just a start. The classic advice given to interested youngsters is still to join a club. But isn't this expensive and exclusive? Not necessarily.

Stump up

For example, Mill Hill Village Club, based in Burton hole Lane, offers weekly training for 12 weeks at the very reasonable cost of £10 for the whole season. The youngest children are 7. There are girls as well as boys, and there are a total of 150 young members (3 years ago there were only 40). Good news for mothers is that "whites" are not necessary tracksuit bottoms and trainers are fine.

This relaxed approach is typical of the clubs I contacted all of whom reported a mushrooming interest among young people. They all participate in leagues and knockout games across the age groups. All these clubs include girls as well as boys.

Girls on top

After all, England's Women have actually won the World Cup, which is more than can be said for the Men!

Finchley Cricket Club offers courses for youngsters for £30 per season. Chief Coach is Tim Selwood a former Middlesex player.

Off break

Alternately, try the courses run by Barnet Sports Development Council at Copthall. Summer holiday courses work out at about £25 for 10 hours. Coaches are fully trained (and think of

the cost of a football supporter's strip!).

Remember that winter practise sessions and special events are there to be enjoyed. Remember, too, that the late Denis Compton, a Hendon boy, was spotted as a 13 year old and 19 year old Ben Holiroakee hit the Australians for six the other day!

Archivist needed

One of the area's most influential organisations, 'The Finchley Society', is looking for a volunteer archivist to collate, organise and make accessible the records and information held by the society.

The society was formed to protect, conserve and enhance the environment of Finchley and Friern Barnet, and awaken public interest in the history and topography of the area.

An ugly new building or an ill planned road, even an advertising hoarding or badly sited traffic sign can irrevocably damage a well loved view or the character of a street.

Space Savers

This society exercises vigilance to benefit the community in Finchley and Friern Barnet; it tries to influence the pattern of change and to preserve the many open spaces and buildings of real interest and quality. Because of the expertise it has built up, the views of the society are often sought on the issues of local importance, by Barnet Council and others.

The society is not against all change, but it is opposed to the creeping conformity that is characteristic of much new building and fights for the survival of the interesting and unique. It takes a close and critical but constructive interest in transport matters, including traffic management schemes, and defends the natural flora and fauna, in particular the ever threatened stock of trees.

Farm Hand

A section of the society is "The Friends of College Farm" who work with the tenant farmer to ensure a future for the farm in Regents Park Road, as a place where farm animals can be seen in a unique suburban environment.

In 1993 the society opened "The Stephen's Collection" in Avenue House. This consists

of displays on the development of writing instruments through the ages.

The latest section of the Finchley Society to be set up is known as "The Friends of Avenue House Grounds". The society has monthly meetings, Christmas Socials, nine newsletters annually, and at least 2 day outings annually. Membership is only £7 (£12 Family).
