East End Road bridge

London Underground Ltd has written to Mr and Mrs Jenkins, the East Finchley couple campaigning for greater pedestrian safety on East End Road bridge.

LUL would consider a foot-bridge, but it would still need unobstructed access to its cables, and Barnet Council would have to pay the full cost.

Barnet Council's Chief Engineer, Robin Hodsdon, repeated that it would be difficult to guarantee cable access. The absolute minimum cost would be £250,000, which would be too much for his limited budget.

Dark humour

Councillor McGuirk agreed, but did nothing to help her case by insisting that East Finchley people could always use The

Causeway or the two pedestrian bridges between Market Place and East End Road. (After dark? I don't think so.)

Later, Robin Hodsdon told THE ARCHER that he would consider requests to narrow the road itself, though it would probably be too late to do anything in the new financial year.

Graffiti eye-opener

Graffiti is increasing throughout the borough. A recent offender was 30 years old, and others are described by police as "well-to-do and well-educated".

These facts emerged at the latest Finchley Forum, held at the Old Barn in Tarling Road. Mark Beauchamp, of Fairlawn Avenue, had asked whether perpetrators could be identified, and if the problem was being tackled in schools.

Another member of the public suggested a minimum age-limit for buying spray-cans, which has apparently cut down graffiti in New York. According to a police representative, our Government will be bringing in similar legislation next year, with a probable minimum age of 16.

Councillor Kathy McGuirk said that youth workers were "liaising" about the best course of action, but the Forum agreed that offenders of all ages have got to be identified.

CCTV cameras may be installed in some areas, and anyone can ring 999 if they actually see the vandals in action.

To deal with this stupidity in the short term, a Mobile Graffiti Removal Unit has been set up to tour the borough. THE ARCHER will keep East Finchley informed on the details.

Chris raises £1400 for disabled children

Northern East Finchley people usually see Chris Costi behind the counter at Takis, the general store in the High Road just past Lewis Gardens (the last shop before the North Circular).

Now they know him as a London Marathon runner.

He completed the course in four-and-a-half hours. "It should have been under four hours," he says, "but I injured a knee after 17 miles. The last five or six miles were the worst, but the atmosphere and the people were

great. I thoroughly enjoyed it."

Chris, who belongs to The Manor in Fortis Green, has been running 30-40 miles a week in training for the past year. So far he has raised £1,400 for Kith and Kids, a society which supports disabled children by focusing on their abilities.
