Organised crime in East Finchley

A local business on the High Street was disturbed one summery Friday afternoon, when a highly organised gang robbed staff of their belongings.

A group of smart looking people, possibly of Eastern European origins, entered a local business. One woman, a five-year old child, and two men distracted people with queries regarding the shop and its staff. The men positioned themselves strategically for a good view and the woman asked to use the toilet. They reportedly spoke in Arabic and possibly exchanged warning messages.

Getaway

Although a member of staff foiled an attempt to rob the till, the robbers took several handbags and the group disappeared into a red Renault. The shop informed the police straight away. The police have not been to investigate. They claim that the group is an untraceable gang of illegal immigrants, and inspection would be ineffective. One employee, whose wife had to cancel her planned holiday, said, "Everything is upside down now. I don't know

what to do. I've managed to save the till money, but I have lost all my own things."

His female colleague, who lost a substantial amount of money, has been traumatically affected and said, "It has changed my whole outlook on life. My privacy has been invaded. I know it's not tragic, but there are organised gangs getting away with it who might seek violent revenge afterwards."

Soft targets

Local people are worried that the gang has been active for a long time in North London. Unfortunately, these places are becoming more attractive to criminals compared to areas such as a CCTVinfested Oxford Street, A neighbouring shop owner called the incident 'opportunist robbery'. He said, "It is madness that we are not more vigilant". He was also distressed by the length of time it took for his 999-call to be answered and by the lack of any response to it.

Help the Aged lome Alone

Too often nowadays we hear the incredible news of children being left at home while the parent looking after them goes off on holiday. While we are horrified by this, it seems obvious that the errant parent must either have had awful problems coping on their own or be incredibly stupid or selfish or both.

Strangely, there is no law which states at what age children can be left alone. Each child is an individual and children mature at different ages, so leaving them is dependant on their ability to cope in an emergency and whether they feel happy about being left. However, the NSPCC advises that no child or young person under at least 16 should be left alone overnight. When leaving teenagers alone, ensure that they are happy about this and that they know how to contact the emergency services and have a telephone number where

they can contact you.

babysitters. Again, there is no law regarding the age of the babysitter but if he/she is under 16 the parents are still legally responsible for their child's safety. Babies or young children, whether asleep or awake, should never be left at home alone, not even for a few minutes. Even most children under 13 should not be left alone for more than a very short time as they may not be able to cope with an emergency, says the NSPCC. They advise leaving clear instructions for dealing with any problems, along with a list of people you trust whom they could go to or telephone. Also, try to put away all obvious dangers such as matches, medicines and sharp objects.
