The extension and refurbishment of Kokos at 72-74, High Road has given that part of East Finchley a smart new look to be proud of. We can be proud too of the reputation of the owner of the shop, George Stavrou, who is known countrywide for the quality of both his footwear and repair business.

George took over the shop in 1976 at the age of 18 with the help of his father, who still repairs shoes in Stroud Green. At the same time he "took over" Colin Whiting, who has been repairing shoes there for 55 years and has never taken a day off! There has been a repair shop on the site for 70 years, but after a couple of years in business George became one of the first repairers to go into retailing. He chose to sell Italian shoes, and found his shop packed with customers on a Saturday.

Over the years, George's skills have earned him an enviable reputation. His vans pick up from over one hundred different outlets in London and the south east and people from all over Great Britain send work to him by post. He gets top quality work from bespoke shoemakers. This is without advertising - all by

word of mouth!

He now employs a team of skilled workers who have to match his own high standards and George is very proud of them. For specialist repairs he has top craftsman Andy Toumazi and hand stitching expert John Douthwaite, who makes orthopaedic footwear. The team will always look for a way to repair shoes, bags, cases, etc. whatever their condition. George is also very proud of his shop assistants, who must have an interest in and care about the people they are serving.

This aspect of care was emphasised by George's wife Maria, who works with him in the business. The couple live in Muswell Hill with their two sons, but they love the village atmosphere of East Finchley.

Bringing Money into East Finchley

Proposal for a Community Development Trust Attracting money to help regenerate East Finchley and tackle the economic, social and environmental issues that affect our community is the aim of a group of local organisations that have met over recent months. We want to get a much wider discussion of the idea and to see what level of support there is for the proposal to develop a Community Development Trust for East Finchlev.

On Saturday 10 February 2001 from 1-3pm we will be holding a meeting in the Finchley Youth Theatre on East Finchley High Road to discuss this proposal. Everybody is welcome.

The proposal to form a Development Trust initially came out of proposals to work with Barnet Council to take over the running and maintenance of open space next to the Old Barn Community Centre in Tarling Road and other open spaces nearby. The open space proposal remains the immediate priority but the Development Trust idea, which will allow us to bid for money not available to the Council, could be expanded to draw in funds

to tackle economic, social environmental issues in our local area of interest to other local groups.



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
