Did you know you can see Wembley Stadium from **East Finchley?**

As the view is to the south-west, the best time to see it is mid-morning with sun to the south-east. No doubt people who live in higher buildings, such as Prospect Ring, get an even better view, especially using binoculars. For the technically minded, the bottom picture is with a standard lens, and the top with a 1000mm telephoto.

18,000 jobs for Cricklewood

Over 18,000 jobs will be created over the next ten years as a result of a major public transport-led regeneration initiative by Cricklewood Redevelopment Ltd, a joint venture between Pillar Property plc and Railtrack Property.

The scheme incorporates office space, shops and leisure facilities including more than 2,500 new homes. In addition, it includes a landmark tower at the end of the M1.

A substantial investment in local transport links is proposed, including a new mainline station and improvements to the existing Cricklewood and Hendon stations. A rapid transport system will carry passengers from the new station through Brent Cross to link up with the London Underground station at Hendon Central.

A locally managed Cricklewood Regeneration Trust will be set up to provide money for local initiatives and harness the benefits of the development for the wider area.

Lauderdale House is situated immediately to the south of Highgate Village, at the north extreme of Waterlow Park. It is the former residence of Nell Gwyn (or Gwynne), the actress mistress of King Charles II.

Numerous activities are run there, such as exhibitions, concerts, workshops, and classes. The park is a pleasant afternoon out for East Finchley residents, with several large ponds and extensive, wellplanted gardens.

For the last 15 years, the Lauderdale House Society have run an annual photographic competition and exhibition, and regularly receive over 400 entries.
