Although the lottery has helped enormously in funding innovative programmes and both fringe theatres and stand-up comedy venues appear to be flourishing, the dearth of repertory cinema in London could be indicative of how home entertainment, plus technology, has impinged upon the movie world. Although it can be considered part of a natural evolutionary process, what might be a boon would be a government initiative to encourage young would-be film makers to produce short films for presentations in cinemas round the country. A five-minute opener preceding the main feature may not only persuade a budding Kubrick that there is an audience for their work, but would highlight any untapped talent.

Reel thing

While we are on this theme, why not a film equivalent of the Royal Academy Summer Programme e.g. a five-day exhibition of short reels? I am aware that the National Film Theatre and also the Phoenix do themed programmes but a higher profile would be welcome.

Now down to business. As mentioned in last month's Archer, the Phoenix is going to close soon for a refurbishment programme and open again in late September. I did not give dates then, but I have them now for your diary. It closes from 11 to 15 June and then operates sporadically through July, closing again from 23 July until 16 September. There will be confirmation of this in the July Archer as changes to the schedule may alter.
