GARDENING

Phew, what a scorcher!

So it's going to be a hot, drought-ridden summer? Do believe it? With the soil the way it is - no. But should the unthinkable occur, then we in rain-sodden London clay will find it cracking and turning into a passable imitation of concrete. Mulch now! I can't see a problem with well-rotted horse manure, or with mushroom compost (providing you don't use it near lime-haters), so spread it around; a few inches thick and leave the work to the worms who, by now, will have come to the surface in a desperate effort to breathe.

Spaced out

Clematis are sprouting now – watch out for caterpillars after the juicy fat buds; a torch and a jam-jar are useful so pop out at night and have a look. Just pick the caterpillars off – what you do with them is up to you. As the shoots develop, space them out on the support and tie them in to avoid that tangled look with a cluster of flowers at the top. Climbing and rambling roses benefit from this too; try to bend the new pliable growths over into arches before tying, that way you will get more laterals developing and more flowers. String is my favourite for tying, doing less damage to stems than wire.

Think Big

Summer containers will soon be on the go and I love them. The bigger the better as then you don't have to water so often. Try to achieve an overall triangular shape so that there is some height to add interest. Cordylines or upright fuchsias would do although both are susceptible to frosts. Trends seem to be moving away from petunias and pelargoniums etc. but I like 'em! They are easy to propagate and carefully arranged colour-schemes in overflowing pots and baskets are always show-stoppers. Don't forget about the edibles - tomatoes, peppers and courgettes are good in pots too. But it would be a good idea to set up some type of watering system with them as inconsistent watering can do a lot of damage to your crop.

My own experience with VSO was in Rwanda, in central Africa, in 1972/3. I went out there to teach English at the National University in Butare in the south of the country. Four of us were placed at the university, each one being assigned to a different faculty. I got medicine. This meant that in addition to classroom teaching, I had frequent trips to the hospital to work alongside medical students and doctors, helping them with the English they needed to know for what they needed to do. I was really lucky - it was a fascinating job.

Unfortunately, our whole group of volunteers was repatriated a year early flown out to neighbouring Uganda over Lake Victoria in a small plane - because of concern about the growing unrest and outbreaks of violence in the country. This was in 1973, 20 years before the full-scale genocide that would take place in 1994. VSO were taking no chances - they never do.

Breast Feeding Awareness Week

The annual campaign run by the National Childbirth Trust and promoted by the government to encourage breastfeeding takes place from 14-20 May.

Although the NCT fully supports a mother's choice in how she decides to feed her baby, the benefits of breastfeeding are proving to have an even greater influence than previously believed. For instance, breastfed babies are generally less likely to be hospitalised and to have less serious illnesses than bottle-fed ones. The antibodies they acquire from their mother's milk not only make a healthier child, but also lead to a healthier adult. Coupled with the fact that it is free and no preparation or sterilization is needed, the only

disadvantage seems to be that dads can't do it!

Breast Value

But many young women are reluctant to breast feed because their own mothers didn't and also because members of their family discourage them. This year's campaign aims to encourage fathers,

grandparents and new mothers to see the value of breastfeeding. Unfortunately, this natural process is not always without problems and the NCT has a new national Breastfeeding Helpline, which mothers can use whether they are members or not. Just ring 0870 444 8708 to get advice from one of their breastfeeding councillors. The earlier the problem is tackled, the better; and the service is free. There are three trainee breastfeeding councillors in Haringey NCT.

Some mothers are self conscious about breastfeeding, particularly in public places, even though it just looks as if they are giving the baby a cuddle. However, current members of East Finchley NCT say that they have had no problems feeding their babies anywhere in the local area.

Planning application update
