The residents of Leslie and Park Road were disappointed to receive notification from Barnet Council that the developer had made an appeal against the Council's decision on the planning permission for 201 High Road.

Just a few days later, the residents were notified that the developer had also put another set of plans forward to Barnet Council, meaning two government offices would be working on two different sets

A resident of Leslie Road contacted the planning office to ask if this was legal, and was informed that this is normal working practice. When the resident expressed surprise, saying it would cause extra

work for all concerned, and more worry to people in the area, the official they spoke to appeared to be in complete agreement.

The main concern is, that if the appeal goes through, then a four-storey block of flats could be built. Yet the second set of plans is for a three-storey block of flats, which is more in keeping with the surrounding area. So residents now have to await the outcome of both planning decisions.

Farmers' **Market Update**

Are we finally going to get a Farmers' Market in Barnet? If so, will it be in the best place, at the best time?

The proposed venue is along the pavement in the High Road, roughly opposite Waitrose in Whetstone, on Thursday or Friday morning. The Council is "reviewing the results" of a consultation with local shopkeepers before coming to a decision.

Barnet will not comment any further at the moment, but a representative of London Farmers' Markets told The Archer that a weekday had been suggested because the area is too quiet for Sunday. Asked about parking, she said that the Council would allow the traders to use a single yellow line, but customers would "probably have to park at Waitrose".

An alternative Whetstone venue was proposed to Barnet some time ago by Ronald Saxon, whose Safe Food Group originally invited London Farmers' Markets to consider this area. Mr Saxon, the former East Finchley hairdresser, suggested holding the market in the car park of the Council offices, on a Saturday or Sunday.

There are now 11 of these markets in London, which provide an opportunity to buy fresh produce direct from farmers within an agreed area.

At present, our nearest markets are at The Angel, Islington, on Sunday morning, and Palmers Green (in the car park of the railway station, 10am - 2pm). There is also one at Swiss Cottage on Wednesday afternoon. For further details, contact London Farmers' Markets on 020 7704 9669.

Nine months after the new owners applied for planning permission to build eighteen one bedroom flats on the Viceroy Close "access area" (also known, quite incorrectly, as Budgen's car park), the silence is deafening. The Barnet Council Planning Office say that the application has still to go before the planning sub-committee, and they are not aware of when that is going to be. This leaves all the people affected very much in limbo.

Meanwhile, almost all the dumped cars have been removed, and, some four months after the threat to impose parking controls, a security company came and ticketed vehicles, not just those of casual visitors or commuters, but of residents and shopkeepers too. Some have paid up and some say they will not; it is interesting to speculate as to whether

these tickets can be enforced However, at least this seems

to have frightened off the all-

day commuters. The latest development is a suggestion that the new owners of the freehold for the existing build-

ings have taken back ownership of the car park. Does this mean that the development will not now go ahead? Or will further twists to this tale emerge?
