Rebirth of the Phoenix

On Sunday 21 April a reopening Benefit Gala was held at the Phoenix cinema to celebrate the transformation of the foyer. The spacious new entrance was packed to capacity with patrons, Friends and supporters, which included the stars Victoria Wood, Maureen Lipman, Sean Hughes, Michael Palin and Tom Wilkinson. The Mayor of Barnet, Anita Campbell, was invited to open the building by chair of the Phoenix Trust Mike Cohen.

Bids for glory

In describing the effort that has gone in to raising money for the four and a half months of work at the cinema, Mike explained that still more is needed. All proceeds from the evening were to go to the Phoenix Fast Forward Fund, starting with a raffle.

An auction of old cinema seats and celebrity memorabilia included the red jock strap worn by Tom Wilkinson in *The Full Monty* which Michael Palin snapped up for a mere £200. Other items that caused tense bidding were a dress worn by Maureen Lipman when she portrayed Joyce Grenfell on stage, as well as a script she used in a Roman Polanski film and a T-shirt of *My Brain Hurts* autographed by Michael Palin.

Victoria Wood displayed all the goods in her own inimitable way, whilst Sean Hughes was an amusing auctioneer, ably assisted by Ms Lipman. Another cause for celebration was the MBE awarded to long-serving projectionist Peter Bayley, who made a moving speech and received warm applause from the audience.

Also warmly received was the first showing of the film *About a Boy*.

The event raised approximately £5,000 towards the final building works bill of just over £40k. Restoration of the auditorium and façade to their 1938 glory is planned for this summer, plus a permanent ramp for disabled access in the same terrazzo as the front steps.

New look

A lift has been installed for access to the cinema and there are now disabled toilets. The new coffee bar is proving to be a great success: You can pop in for a drink and muse through the informative leaflets and information on display, including how to become a

supporter of what is believed to be the oldest, purpose-built continuously serving cinema in the UK.

Waitrose warning

Residents living close to the Greater London Hire Company have received letters from its managing director John Scott.

The car hire and despatch company has been trading for nearly 33 years from a site opposite East Finchley station and, with 17 years to run on the lease, is looking forward to many more years of business there.

However, Mr Scott is concerned about the activities of a property company representing John Lewis Ltd., who claim to be interested in building a Waitrose store on a site bordered by Baronsmere Road, Ingram Road, Brompton Grove and the High Road - which covers the GLH area. In his letter Mr Scott points out the detrimental effects this could have on the locality and raises the idea of forming an Action Group to oppose the proposed store.

Regular readers will know that when *The Archer* reported on this issue in December 2001, Barnet Council had not received any formal planning application despite the plans having been seen by certain individuals. At the time of writing that is still the case.

ARTS AND CINEMA

Those out there who can remember my monthly outpourings over the past couple of years (I am not sure if I number amongst them) will testify that my particular hobby horse was the double bill on Sundays at the Phoenix.



Here was an opportunity to catch up on a film that might have passed you by, or maybe another opportunity to see an old favourite again, or to celebrate an actor or director of renown. I am happy to say that everything changes but things still remain the same (no, I don't know what it means either). Sunday matinees rule, OK.

As from 9 June there are four features, of which three are "must see", starting with a homage to Jean Pierre Jeunet's *Amelie* and *Delicatessen*. Both are off-the-wall comedies and uniquely French. *Amelie* successfully walks the line between cuteness and whimsicality as it charters the romantic life of its much-maligned heroine and her attempts to woo the person of her choice. *Delicatessen* almost defies description, so I won't attempt it, other than to say that it is a devastating slant on French cuisine, a kind of Gary Rhodes meets Sweeny Todd!

On 16 June there is a tribute to an actor who has taken 30 years to become an overnight success (trust me not to miss out on the cliché!). This is the day of Gene Hackman and, whilst the *Royal Tenenbaums* and *Heartbreaker* may not be the purists' choice to profile the talents of the man, they are both highly enjoyable and indicate that Mr Hackman definitely has a flair for comedy, not always seen amongst America's finest actors.

Terror and Horror

To close the month there is a focus on American Gothic - Night of the Hunter, the only directorship credited to Charles Laughton. It features a truly memorable performance by Robert Mitchum as a preacher in the Deep South, who takes advantage of a lonely widow in order to liberate her of her money. Lambasted at the time, it now falls under the heading of cult classic. The companion to this film is David Lynch's Blue Velvet a bizarre look at small town America, with an OTT cameo by Denis Hopper. The remaining Sunday matinee is Time Out on the 23rd.

The June programme is: 7 June, the award winning movie on the Bosnia/Serb conflict *No-Man's Land* plus *Y Tu Mama Tambien*; 14 June, *Betty Fisher and Other Stories* - your guess is as good as mine regarding this film, because at the time of writing not only have I not seen it but I have never even heard of it.
