Recycling robot visits Barnet schools

Cycler the rapping robot is back on tour in Barnet bringing his unique educational show to primary schools.

Cycler, who visited Holy Trinity School in East Finchley last year, promotes the '3Rs' message - reduce, reuse and recycle - and complements Barnet Council's comprehensive schools recycling educaagreed to develop an action plan to reduce their waste and increase the amount of material they recycle. An internal recycling collection system will be developed with support and advice from the council.

All schools hosting the visit use the free recycling collection service provided by the council in partnership with ECT Recycling Ltd, which supplies bins for paper, cans and glass. Over 90 per cent of Barnet schools have joined this service so far.

Material man

Cycler, which is made from recovered waste material, tours schools throughout the UK, accompanied by a fullyqualified education officer from Waste Watch. The programme is funded through the Biffaward scheme.

Cllr Matthew Offord, Barnet's Cabinet Member for Environment, says, "This is such a novel way to teach youngsters about the importance of waste minimisation and recycling. Engaging children will help them to adopt the recycling habit at an early age and take it with them through life." THE ARCHER will let you know when Cycler visits East Finchley again.
