



What has the Big Local project been up to?

Would you like to find out more about how £1 million of National Lottery could be spent in East Finchley? The Grange Big Local project is hosting a Community Festival this month to get everyone involved.

"Everyone is welcome," said a spokesperson from the Grange Big Local board. "There'll be plenty of activities for old and young and everyone in between, food and drink, community information, a bouncy castle and a variety of games.

"Importantly, there'll be a chance to have your say on how the £1 million should be spent. We'll be presenting a draft plan so you can give us feedback on what you think the priorities are. And you can find out how to get a grant to start a social enterprise in the area."

"Everyone is welcome," said for local residents to decide how bokesperson from the Grange to spend over the next 10 years.

The area covered by the award runs between the North Circular to the north, the High Road to the East, East End Road to the west and Church Lane to the south. It includes the Grange, Font Hills and Thomas More estates.

The community festival takes place at Bishop Douglass School in Hamilton Road from 12 till 4pm on Sunday 27 September.

This is the third Grange Big Local Festival. Last year's was a youth event at Brownswell Road and was run collaboratively with Art Against Knives.

Help a homeless cat or kitten

Staff and volunteers at the RSPCA shop in the High Road have alerted us to a new drive by the charity to find homes for cats and kittens.

Hayley Plows, animal welfare officer for the Central and North East London branch of the RSPCA, said: "The more homes we can get the more cats we can help, and stop them living and breeding on the streets of London."

Anyone who offers to take on these cats receives a large release pen to keep them in for the first ten days to establish their home and feeding routine so they don't just run away. New homes are also given a starter pack of litter, a litter tray, a bed, toys and food. If you are interested in providing an area for these cats please contact 020 8366 3313.

Off to the country

There are thousands of feral cats in London who are now so used to fending for themselves that they are no longer suited to a domestic environment. Farmland can make a good alternative for these cats, providing the space they need to roam around and a safe environment away from busy traffic.

Feral cats taken in by the RSPCA are neutered, vaccinated, tested for disease, microchipped, de-flead and wormed before being released.
