# Nick Hornby

at the Phoenix

By Daphne Chamberlain It was a full house at the Phoenix last month to meet Nick Hornby, author of Fever Pitch among many other novels and screenwriter of Brooklyn, following another showing of the film. Unlike many adaptations from novels, it is being seen by a lot of people who have read Colm Toibin's story of a 1950s Irish girl torn between her homeland and New York.

Nick called it a beautiful, quiet book with a watchful heroine, but it's not as inwardlooking as he had expected. "A lot does happen. It is about what people do to her. There are no bad characters, but there is tension as we wait for her decision."

The script took a long time. He needed to write a lot of dialogue, as Colm had not put much in the book. Saoirse Ronan, who plays the heroine, was only 15 when he began, but fortunately she grew up to play the part.

#### A topical theme

There could be another reason for now to be the right time for it. A member of the audience wondered whether an important theme of the film was immigration. Nick Hornby said he hadn't thought of that at first, but it now seems relevant.

Cinema of the 1940s and 50s, and also some of the 1970s (like Running on Empty), made him want to work in film. He loves writing scripts, but acknowledges that a lot of time can be wasted on things that never see the light of day. That's very different from writing a novel, which can always be accessed. He is very happy to have his own novels adapted by others.

Returning to the theme of Brooklyn, he added, "Wherever you are, you are in the wrong place. America itself was built
