Group action over estate gas crisis

A group of 54 residents on the Strawberry Vale estate are claiming compensation after suffering months without a gas supply through the depths of last winter, leaving them unable to cook and many of them with no heating or hot water.

Law firm Hodge, Jones and Allen is applying for a Group Litigation Order against the Peabody Trust Housing Association at the Central London County Court, which will allow 49 more residents to join the five who have already applied.

Deprived of a basic service

Their gas was cut off in January, when National Grid reported a faulty meter. This was replaced, but the Peabody Trust refused to reconnect the supply until forced to by a High Court injunction.

An estimated 240 of the 270 homes in Strawberry Vale were left without a gas supply. It was not until May that all the homes were reconnected.

Laurence Williamson, chair of the Strawberry Vale Residents Association, said: "A landlord responsible for the

homes of hundreds of people, from families with young children to elderly people living alone, deprived them of their gas supply, a basic service that they depended on to cook with.

"Some families were also without heating and hot water and at one point the Red Cross came to the estate with hot meals for residents. This was all during the winter months, affecting vulnerable people's health and leaving many with considerable debts." Legal proceedings disclosed that the Peabody Trust, which took over the estate in 1998, had not obtained a Gas Safety Case in line with regulations that came into force in 1996. Consequently they had been failing to adhere to health and safety regulations relating to the gas supply. The Health & Safety Executive required them to make necessary changes in March.
