## Cat death leads to caution for dog owner

The distressing death of a cat at the jaws of two large dogs in Cherry Tree Road, N2, was reported on the front page of *The Archer* last October.

Two large dogs were photographed and filmed at the scene by residents and it later transpired that these same dogs had been involved in other attacks around the Muswell Hill area.

The police were informed at the time and a subsequent investigation eventually reached a conclusion.

Earlier this year the woman who was in charge of the dogs

was given a conditional caution, an option introduced by the Criminal Justice Act 2003. It differs from a simple caution as there are certain conditions which must be complied with in order to avoid prosecution.

The police have to ensure that the conditions are being complied with and, as far as the police are concerned, this matter is now finalised.

## Speed dating for businesses

## Groups line up to use new community centre

The first meeting of the Tarling Road Community Hub User Group took place in late January, when a series of monthly meetings was established to make progress at the former Old Barn site.

This user group will discuss and help shape the internal structure and facilities of the centre, including the community space, which is due to be rebuilt in 2018. The group will also play a part in identifying and selecting the organisation which will ultimately manage the building.

Members of the group include local councillors and representatives of a range of organisations who have expressed an interest in using space within the new centre. Previous users of the Old Barn such as the Pre-School group, the Monday Youth Club, the Grange Big Local and Finchley Music School were represented, as was the Somali Bravanese Welfare Association (SBWA).

The meeting was held at relatively short notice so organisations such as Barnet Lone Parent Centre, Community Souls, Art Against Knives, Homestart, Newstead and others will be joining in at future meetings.

### Helpful example

This inaugural meeting included a presentation from the Rev Simon Rea about the OneStonegrove Centre project in Edgware which has already gone through a similar process. Whilst there are a number of differences between the two projects, attendees said it was really helpful in focussing some frank and wide ranging discussions on the next steps for the Tarling Road Centre, including what the community and stakeholders' views and priorities are, and how to get the best out of the centre for the whole community within the budgetary and practical constraints.

It is hoped that with everyone getting round the table on

a regular basis, including a key range of council officials and in partnership with the Somali Bravanese Community, a centre can be developed that incorporates the best of the Old Barn,

meets the needs of our diverse community and is financially and practically sustainable.
