## Exotic Hyderabadi cooking close to home

Asian flavours can be found close to home with the arrival of Shahi Pakwaan on Aylmer Parade. Specialising in Hyderabadi fare from central India, owner Khaleel Ahmed's mission is to overturn the misconceptions of Indian food and service by offering authentic dishes from home.

His vision is brought to life by chef Siraj Mohammed, a close family friend who spent several years mastering his craft in India, Mexico and California before moving to London. Both have lived in East Finchley for many years and are keen to share their beloved classics with their neighbours.

### Regional dishes

While the menu features familiar favourites like onion bhaaji, tandoori chicken and lamb bhuna gosht, it's the lesser-known regional specialities that best showcase the chef's skills. Chicken 65 may not sound very inspiring, but the lightly battered chicken pieces, deep fried then cooked with curry leaves, garlic, ginger and chillies, are tender and tasty with a hint of heat to finish.

For mains, the biryani is a must: delicately spiced rice and meat served in a decorative clay pot. Diners with a sweet tooth will love the spongy, soothing Ras Malai to round off their meal.

While the restaurant can seat 25-30 people, Shahi Pakwaan also offer a takeaway service via Just Eat and Hungry House within a 2.5-mile radius (10% discount on collections). A set lunch with a draft beer or soft drink for £6 is available on Tuesdays (12pm-3pm) as part of EFAB's Silver Service programme for customers aged 60 and over.

# Marcella was a friend to so many

It was standing room only at St Mary's Catholic Church on 31 March as family, friends, neighbours and colleagues paid tribute to Marcella Hampson, née Mullally, who passed away in hospital after a courageous four-year battle with cancer. Despite the size of the gathering, the service was personal and moving, with emotional eulogies from family and friends.

Marcella, known to many as Marcie, moved to East Finchley in 1999, and quickly made many longstanding friendships, not least through the local NCT. She was a familiar face on the High Road, helped with the East Finchley festivals, and sang in north London choir The Angels of Chaos, who performed at the church and at the (lengthy) wake at Madden's Bar.

Actress and friend Michelle Collins, recalling Marcella's love of the arts, said: "She would come along whenever I performed... she always had time for people."

Born in Muswell Hill, Marcella studied English and Drama at the University of Kent, arriving, in the words of university friend Sue Kelvin, as a "flame-haired Irish beauty with a glorious voice and a vibrant sense of humour" who cut a dash as a "seriously cool London rock chick".

During an accomplished 25-year career in PR, she was a director for leading agency Hill & Knowlton and, more recently, worked at East Finchley-

based Hallett Retail, where she became director of marketing and PR in 2010. "Marcella was an inspirational woman with an amazing passion for life," said founder Wendy Hallett MBE. "She will be deeply missed."

Marcella was clever, funny, kind, strong and generous; a
