



Anger of residents as they see their pavements vanish beneath their feet

Barnet Council's programme of resurfacing pavements in East Finchley with black asphalt instead of traditional paving stones, in many cases without fully consulting residents, has met with widespread condemnation.

East Finchley ward councillor Arjun Mitra told *The Archer* that he had received many representations from residents over the issue and that 80-90 per cent of them had been negative. Beresford Road pavements had already been re-surfaced before work moved to Huntingdon Road last month and then on to the other county roads.

Safety issues

The council's point of view is that cracked and broken pavements represent a danger to pedestrians. Simply re-positioning existing slabs will only be a short-term solution, which will need to be repeated in the near future. The council budget provides for new paving slabs in areas designated as 'city centres' but in East Finchley this only applies to the High Road and the first few yards of the side roads.

This view has been challenged by many residents who argue that the whole area should be re-paved, as has occurred in other parts of the borough. When Kitchener Road was resurfaced earlier this year, all its paving stones were replaced.

Tree roots are destructive and where soft, flexible asphalt is used that problem can be alleviated, but residents complain

that the more widespread use of hard asphalt elsewhere is aesthetically offensive and that such a surface will also crack and distort in time.

Longer consultation urged

Councillor Mitra added that there had been virtually no consultation period and residents in Huntingdon Road were given only a few days' notice of the commencement of the work, having been promised longer. He and his fellow East Finchley councillors are continuing to press for further consultation with residents.

The story is not all one sided, however, as two residents told *The Archer* that they approved of the new surface and that it would be safer, particularly for the visually impaired. One Huntingdon Road resident added that he thought it would be easy on the eye, commenting that he would rather see money spent on street cleansing than on expensive paving.

Second report on local surgery finds failure to improve

A second Care Quality Commission (CQC) inspection of the Cherry Tree Surgery in July resulted in a rating of inadequate in all but one category. The practice in Southern Road, N2, was given six months to improve after a two-day inspection in January (*The Archer*, June 2017) and received some additional support.

Despite this, the CQC regulator did not find the necessary improvements had been made. 'Inadequate' was applied to categories of safety, effectiveness, responsiveness and leadership and 'requires improvement' to the caring aspect.

All this has left many of the practice's patients in disbelief. Now they learn that there are to be urgent discussions about

its future, with the surgery's service being kept under close review, possibly leading to some form of enforcement action.

Within six months another inspection will be held. Should there be insufficient improvement, the CQC will move to close the service. To read the report in full visit www.cqc.org.uk and search for Dr Sergio de Cesare.
